

In the past few years, our world has witnessed a series of citizen campaigns calling for democracy and freedom. The international community has offered solidarity to many of these populations in nearly every corner of the globe. Recent events have highlighted a gap in public diplomacy and have initiated the building of bridges for citizen diplomats between the United States and countries with significant Muslim populations in Africa, Asia, the Middle East and Southeastern Europe.

One such initiative, known as the Kennedy-Lugar Youth Exchange and Study Program (YES) proves that diplomacy is not just in the hands of politicians. U.S. families of all shapes and sizes can play a role in changing the world, through the mere act of sharing their home with a high school student from one of these countries. Students on the YES program live in the U.S. with their host families, attend local high schools, and engage in activities to learn about American society, values, and leadership skills, while simultaneously helping to educate Americans about their own countries and cultures. Additionally, this scholarship program is approved and funded by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA).
